

The <u>much-discussed spike in homicide rates</u> between 2014 and 2016 is due almost entirely to gun homicides, a Wonkblog analysis of federal homicide data reveals.

The spike was so drastic that in 2016, gun homicides accounted for a greater share of all homicides than at any point in the federal record, which contains more than 80 years of complete data for the United States.


Since 2014, the number of non-gun homicides rose by less than 2 percent, from 4,864 in 2014 to 4,947 in 2016. But during those same two years the number of gun homicides rose by more than 30 percent, from 11,000 to well over 14,000.

Put another way, guns alone accounted for nearly 98 percent of the observed homicide rate increase between 2014 and 2016.






City of Richmond – Homicides January 1 – April 1, 2018






City of Richmond – Aggravated Assault and Robberies January 1 – April 1, 2018

Root Cause Partnership with Richmond Commonwealth Attorney

- This partnership with the Richmond Commonwealth Attorney's Office is focused on addressing systemic causes of criminality through non-traditional means; identifying the root cause of societal harms and addressing those issues rather than the criminal outcomes they generate.
- To have stakeholders and residents come together to identify, analyze and discuss targeted approaches to crime.
- This will be an opportunity for stakeholders and residents to coalesce and share information on the root causes and criminogenic factors driving crime.
- An opportunity to improve our strategies, policies and procedures beyond what's been tried with deeper consideration of those connections between root causes and effective prevention/intervention.
- The combined value of empirical evidence, theoretical reason and community experience may inform sector specific law enforcement strategies that are not defined by a singular crisis; rather the focus is on prevention versus reaction.

One Richmond Combined Interdisciplinary Team (ORCIT)

- Create an inter-departmental approach to address violent crime and social issues
- To work in partnership and collaboration with all portfolios within the City of Richmond Government to reduce crime and violence
- To collaborate with non-governmental organizations and non-profits to build a safe and healthy Richmond
- To design a coordinated strategy and response for the intervention of those involved in violent criminal behavior
- To provide a coordinated response to address the needs of those impacted by violence

RVA League for Safer Streets

- Concept was initiated in the late 1980s as a solution to address high-crime in the inner city during latenight hours
- The project utilizes the Midnight Basketball League concept to address and reduce social distance between the Richmond Police Department (RPD) and communities experiencing an increase in crime
- The Richmond Police Department believes that RVA League for Safer Streets (formerly known as the Midnight Basketball League) will address the current peak in crime in the City of Richmond and provide a safe and productive outlet for inner city youth and young adults
- Community Policing is the mindset and operational practice of reducing and managing crime risks by actively engaging in programs, projects and activities in communities where people live, work, learn and play
- One hour is dedicated to emphasizing evidence based decision making, problem-solving, increase transparency, better utilization of resources and sustainability.
- Provides for a safe haven for young adults' ages, 17 24, to learn about issues and concerns that
 impact their community, obtain resources for employment, health and wellness, voter registration, and
 life skills while participating in a seasonal basketball tournament.
- The Richmond Police Department's organizational program strategy is to reduce crime, reduce recidivism and improve the quality of life.
