2018 HIGHLIGHT OF EVENTS

Television station CBS6 airs a news story in which the Richmond Police Department is recognized as a national leader in homicide clearance rates according to a decade of research by the Washington Post.

RPD **Project H.O.P.E. TV** airs on Wednesdays beginning March 14, 2018 through April 11, 2018 on Comcast Channel 95. The show addresses topics related to ex-offenders transitioning back into society.

Respect Richmond summer initiative to combat violent crime using social media is relaunched after a successful earlier effort.

The Department releases **body-worn camera footage** following the officer-involved shooting death of a 24-year old man in apparent mental distress.

Four multi-day **Traffic/Violent Crime initiatives** are conducted during the first and second quarters of the year.

An additional week is added to the traditional 30-week **police recruit training** schedule to accommodate an expanded curriculum that included community engagement experiences in public housing communities, city schools and homeless shelters. Recruits, also, graduated as certified bicycle officers.

The Department begins posting and regularly updating **crisis intervention training and use-of-force** data on the police website, (www.richmondgov.com/police), that lists the number and type of incidents in which force was used.

In response to an amended law pertaining to police vehicles, RPD reinstates displaying steady **blue lights** on the light bars of patrol vehicles.

The RPD **Property and Evidence** unit relocates to another facility located at 1451 Commerce Road.

A photograph of Officer DeDongio Randall giving a boy a pair of spare socks goes viral on **social media** garnering national attention.

Lt. Kelly O'Connell's **Boys In Blue** mentorship program brings youths to the Diamond to enjoy a fun baseball game.

The **116th and 117th Basic Recruit Class** graduates are commissioned for a total of 44 new officers.

A **Career Expo** featuring 40 on-site employers offers job opportunities and resume assistance in partnership with

Richmond Public Schools, Project Give Back to Community, the Carol Adams Foundation and Richmond Police.

Metro Richmond Crime Stoppers unveils P3 Tips (Public, Police and Private Sector), a new mobile app and website that enables the public to share crime or safety-related tips and information. All tips are anonymous and identities protected.

The Twenty-fourth Latino Citizens Academy graduates 15 residents.

Media Relations conducts multiple campaigns throughout the year that include Crime Stoppers Monday, Four-Legged Fridays and Adoptions, Throwback Thursday, Good News, Region-wide Highway Safety, Cold Cases and P3 Tips.

Following 14 weeks of rigorous training, **three new canines** (Zeus, Havoc and Draco) and their handlers complete Canine (K-9) Basic School. In other K-9 news, four Belgian Malinois puppies are donated to the Department and K-9 Phantom retires after working seven years with handler Officer Montague Agee.

A successful series of **Town Hall meetings**, one in each precinct, is conducted.

Another record-setting year with over 120 registered groups participating in the City of Richmond's **National Night Out** celebration.

Friends of Richmond Mounted Squad host the annual Richmond Ride for the 25th year in a row.

Four Richmond Officers are honored by the Virginia Chief's of Police Association with **Lifesaving awards**.

"Criminal Investigative Analysis," a 12-week, web-based training course for sworn and civilian employees, is hosted by the RPD.

The RPD hosts a screening of the movie **"The Hate U Give"** and conducts an open discussion with several dozen students afterwards.

Area police, including Richmond, work jointly to protect police scanners by **encrypting radio frequencies** to block non-law enforcement listeners.

Colonel Alfred Durham retires after serving nearly four years as Chief of Police.

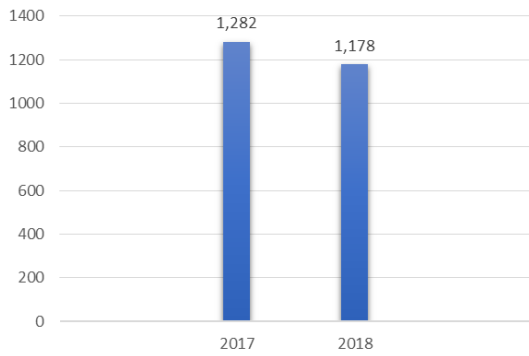

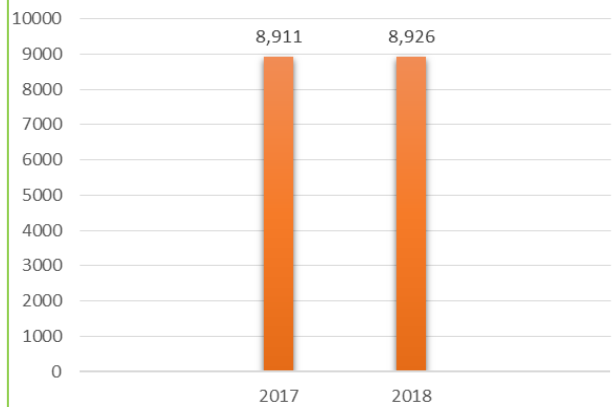

Violent Crime - Property Crime Major Crime Percentages

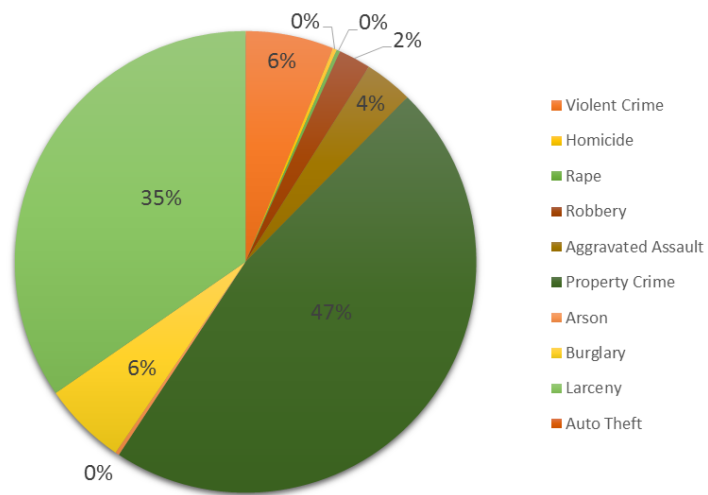
Number of Violent Crimes



Number of Property Crimes

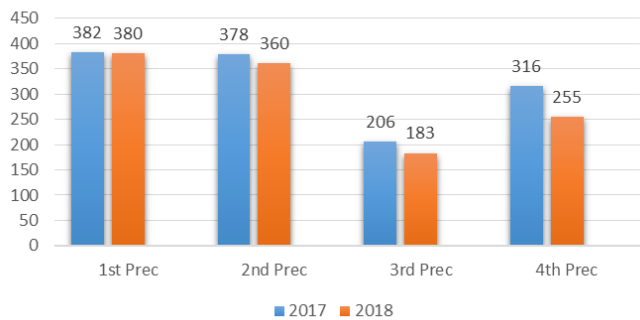


Major Crime Percentages

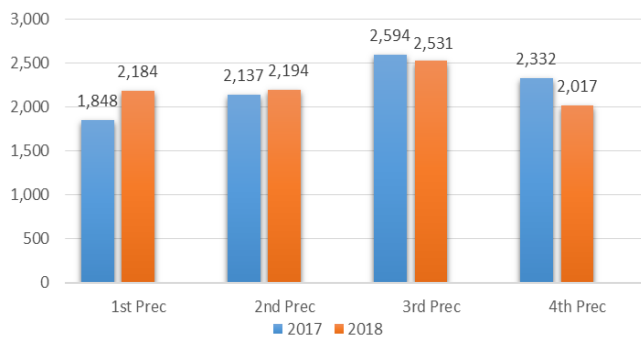

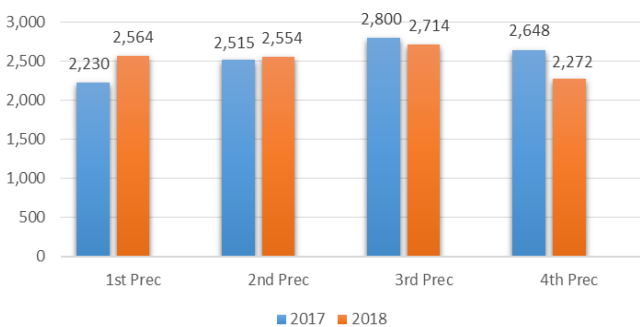
Violent Crime by Precinct



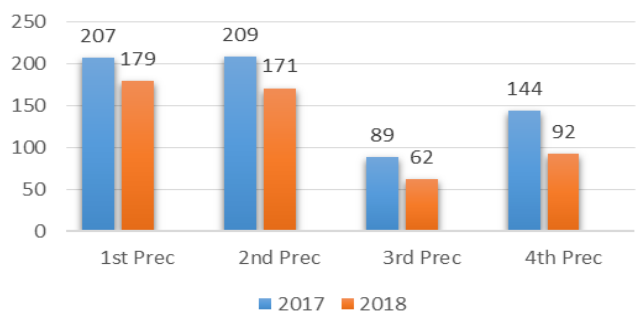
Property Crime by Precinct



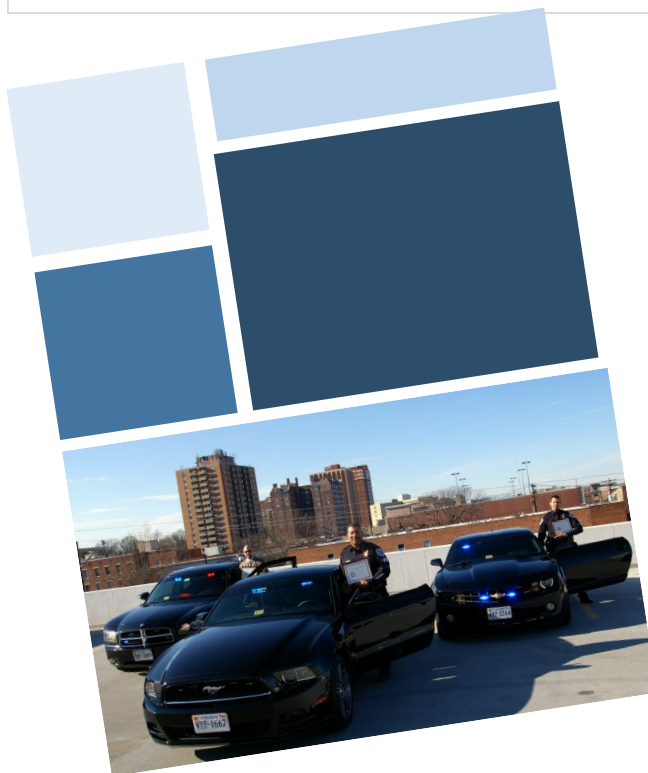
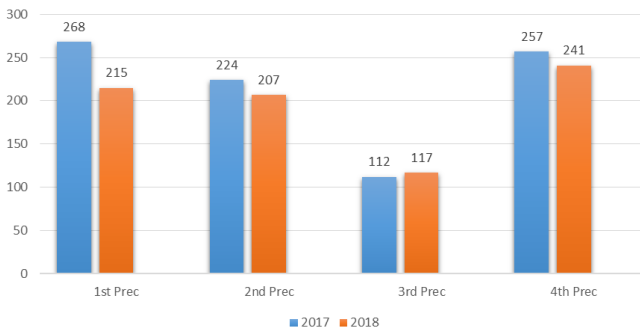
Major Crime by Precinct



Firearm-related Major Crime by Precinct

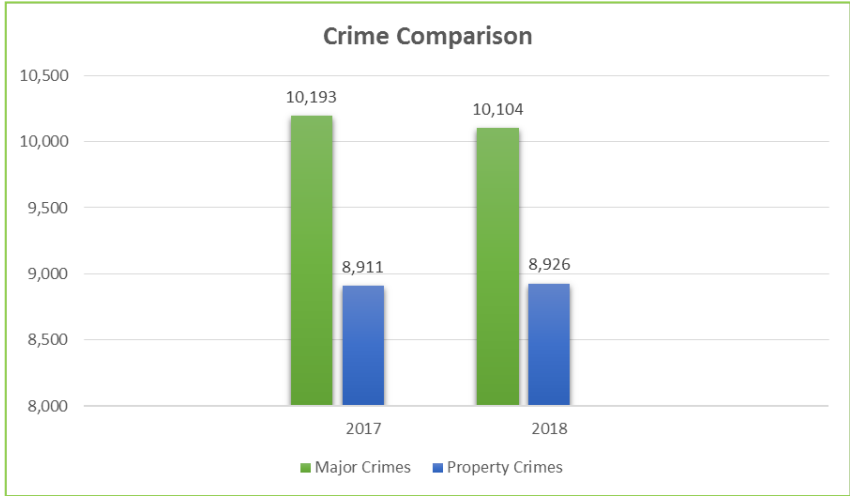


Illegal Firearms Seized by Precinct
